About this tour

Penn's **singular campus** distinguishes it as unique among Ivy League schools, for having all 4 undergraduate and 12 graduate and professional schools co-located together on one campus. The campus stretches across more than 300 acres and comprises more than 200 buildings! The large size and footprint of the University makes it difficult to tour the entire campus in one visit or outing.

This self-guided campus tour highlights many iconic landmarks on Penn's campus, as well as some of the spaces and buildings that you may need to know as you embark on your graduate education at Penn. The tour includes both the center of campus, between 34th & 38th Streets. Complete all or part of the tour at your own pace and use the hyperlinks in our online version to learn more about different places and resources at Penn. TOUR BEGINS in front of 3615 Locust Walk

GRADUATE STUDENT CENTER, 3615 Locust Walk

The <u>Graduate Student Center</u>, was created in 2001 to serve as a central hub for resources, activities, support, and advocacy for all graduate and professional students at Penn.

- The Grad Center provides a centrally-located space to relax, eat lunch, and connect with other graduate and professional students from across the university.
- The Center has a first-floor student lounge area, as well as quiet study and meeting rooms on the 3rd floor.
- The Grad Center also holds hundreds of events each year designed to help students gain the professional and research skills, experiences, and community they

and research skills, experiences, and community they need for a successful graduate experience.

The Grad Center building is also home to the <u>Family Resource Center</u>, which provides resources, programming, and support for Penn students and postdocs with children.

- The Family Center is located on the lower level of the building.
- The Family Center space includes a family reading room, nap space, conference room, and a children's
 play area complete with toys, games, and books; private lactation room, and community bulletin
 boards.

Locust Walk

Right now, you are located on Locust Walk, which is a half-mile pathway that runs through the center of campus. Locust Walk is one of Penn's most iconic spaces and a main pedestrian thoroughfare for members of the Penn community and neighboring residents, stretching from 34th St. to 40th St.

On any given day you'll see community members using Locust Walk to commute to and from various campus locations, student organizations handing out flyers for upcoming events, and people relaxing or enjoying a meal at one of the seating areas along the Walk.

- Locust Walk used to be part of Locust Street, a city street open to car traffic. It was closed in the 1960s as Penn's campus grew and vehicles presented an increasing safety risk for growing numbers of students traversing the street on their way to and from class.
- Inside Steinberg-Dietrich Hall (3620 Locust Walk) are original streetlamps from Locust Street. Steinberg was built around the existing Dietrich building and holds one of the original New York Stock Exchange trading booths.

ARCH Building

ARCH BUILDING, 3601 Locust Walk

The **ARCH Building** (Arts, Research, and Culture House) is home to several centers, as well as student meeting and lounge space. Within the building, you will find:

- The Pan-Asian American Community House,
 MAKUU: The Back Cultural Center, and La Casa
 Latina, as well as meeting space for on-campus groups. These and other cultural resource centers are accessible and inviting to all at Penn.
- Center for Undergraduate Research and Fellowships (CURF), located on the 2nd floor, provides assistance to graduate students seeking to apply for prestigious external fellowships and grant programs.
- The ARCH building also includes meeting space for campus groups and a self-service café (1st floor).

"CASTLE" Fraternity House, 250 S. 36th St. (southwest corner of 36th St. & Locust Walk)

Across the street from the ARCH building is a Victorian suburban Gothic mansion, popularly referred to as "Castle."

- Designed and constructed as the Psi Upsilon fraternity in 1890.
- The Food Network filmed an episode of "Dinner: Impossible" here in which fraternity brothers had to make a nice dinner for the President and other dignitaries.
- "Transformers 2" was also filmed here.





CONTINUE EAST ALONG LOCUST WALK STOP: Locust Walk & Woodland Walk

WOODLAND WALK

Woodland Walk is a diagonal walkway cutting through the center of campus.

Penn's campus along Woodland Avenue, creating traffic and logistical issues for motorists and pedestrians on Locust Walk. In connection with Penn's efforts to pedestrianize campus during the 1950s-1970s, the City began moving trolleys underground in the 1950s and deeded the portion of Woodland Avenue from 33rd to 40th Street to the University.



- Today a full-sized reproduction of a Woodland Avenue trolley can be found at 37th & Spruce, capping an entry to the trolley stop below.
- You can still see remnants of the original Woodland Avenue in the sharp angled buildings along Woodland Walk (e.g., the undergraduate Quad, Stouffer Triangle, Fisher-Bennett Hall, etc.)

LOVE Sculpture, Locust Walk & Woodland Walk

The iconic <u>LOVE sculpture</u> was created by Robert Indiana (1966) and donated to the University in 1996 and sits prominently at the center of campus.

- Another version of this sculpture can be seen in <u>LOVE Park</u> at 16th and JFK, where it was originally installed in 1976 as part of the United States Bicentennial celebration

SWEETEN ALUMNI HOUSE, 3533 Locust Walk

Sweeten Alumni House is home for **Penn Alumni** on campus.

- Alumni Relations hold numerous events throughout the year that are open to current students and provide an <u>alumni database</u> where you can search for Penn alumni interested in mentoring or networking with current students.
- After you graduate there are many ways to stay connected with Penn, including: Regional alumni clubs; Alumni newsletters; Industry based alumni organizations; Diversity alliance; School based alumni groups; and more.
- We hope you stay connected to us for many years to come!

COLLEGE GREEN

Locust Walk terminates at <u>College Green</u>, one of Penn's many open spaces that brings our campus community together for gatherings and traditions.

- College Green is a popular space for students to gather and relax during nice weather.
- Like all spaces on Penn's campus, this area has wifi through AirPennNet
- College Green is the location for many events during <u>GradFest</u>, the annual week-long celebration for grad students each fall coordinated by GAPSA.

COLLEGE HALL, 1 College Hall

College Hall (1871) was the first campus building constructed in West Philadelphia when Penn moved west from Center City.

- The building originally housed nearly all college functions, including the library, classrooms, laboratories and offices. Today, the building houses a mix of administrative and academic offices, including: The President's Office, Provost's Office, History Department, Office of Social Equity & Community, and more.
- College Hall has many of the oldest <u>Ivy Day stones</u> on campus.
 - Since 1873, every graduating undergraduate class has placed at least one Ivy Day stone on the University campus (usually on a building). Stones often commemorate sites or events of significance (e.g., a war plane is depicted in the 1944 stone).
 - O Note: the "97" class stone is actually 1897!
- College Hall was placed on the National Registry of Historic Places for its significance in the history of collegiate architecture.



TURN SOUTH, CONTINUE DOWN STEPS/RAMP NEXT TO COLLEGE HALL STOP: Penn Commons (between College Hall & Houston Hall)

<u>Penn Commons</u> is an open-air space that five buildings: College Hall, Cohen Hall, Williams Hall, Houston Hall, and Irvine Auditorium.

COHEN HALL, 249 S. 36th St.

Claudia Cohen Hall is located along the west side of Penn Commons and is the second oldest building on campus, completed in 1874.

- The building was originally opened for use by the Medical School.
- The building now houses several of the humanities departments in the School of Arts & Sciences, as well as Undergraduate Admissions
- Both College Hall and Cohen Hall have a greenish hue, not because they are moldy, but because they were built with Pennsylvania green serpentine stone. This green colored granite absorbs water at a faster rate than regular granite, requiring ongoing restoration.

HOUSTON HALL, 3417 Spruce St.

Houston Hall was the first college student union building constructed in the United States (1894).

- Houston Hall originally contained a bowling alley, swimming pool, music room, gymnasium, theater, and billiards room. It now has a food court, study space, and auditoriums, meeting rooms, and offices.
- Students can reserve meeting and event spaces in Houston Hall and several other campus buildings through Perelman Quadrangle.
- The <u>Graduate and Professional Student</u> <u>Assembly (GAPSA)</u> office is on the 2nd floor.

GAPSA is the student government org representing all graduate & professional students at Penn. It offers social and academic activities, travel grants, and more!

IRVINE AUDITORIUM, 3401 Spruce St.

Located at the southeast corner of Penn Commons is **Irvine Auditorium**, which houses Penn's most impressive performance space.

- The Main Hall is decorated with symbols that depict the philosophical history of the University.
- University programs and the undergraduate Social Planning and Events Committee (SPEC) use this venue for large events and speakers.
 - Notable past speakers include: Joseph Biden, Bill Clinton, Sanjay Gupta, Anderson Cooper, Peyton Manning, Benjamin Netanyahu, Christopher Reeves, Whoopi Goldberg, and Serena Williams.
 - Irvine Auditorium also houses one of the country's largest pipe organs (Curtis Organ, built in 1926).

CONTINUE TO EAST END OF PENN COMMONS, TURN LEFT AND CONTINUE NORTH STOP: East side of College Green



Fisher Fine Arts Library

FISHER FINE ARTS LIBRARY, 220 S. 34th St.

The <u>Fisher Fine Arts Library</u> was built in 1890 by renowned architect Frank Furness and is one of the many resources students, faculty, and staff use to study and conduct research.

- Inside, the beautiful main room is a popular place for quiet study. The room was used in the movie "Philadelphia" for a scene in which the character played by Tom Hanks meets with his lawyer.
- The library is also the home of the <u>Arthur Ross Art</u> <u>Gallery</u>, which is free with your PennCard.
- The building is a National Historic Landmark and is considered the major masterpiece of Philadelphia's most important Victorian Era architect, Frank Furness, whose work can be seen throughout the city-some of most beautiful include homes around Rittenhouse Square.
- The style of the library reflects the industrial revolution –the exterior looks like railroad station;
 Furness loved factories and railroads. The exterior looks uniformly red but is composed of different materials –terra cotta sandstone and brick –to create diversity and texture in monotone red theme.
 You can see Frank Furness' buildings throughout Philadelphia

MEYERSON HALL, 210 S. 34th St.

Just to the north of Fisher is **Meyerson Hall**, which is the main building for the **Weitzman School of Design**.

- Built in 1967, Meyerson reflects the architectural and design trends of the 1960s.
- At the entrance of the building is the bright red "Jerusalem Stabile" sculpture, by famed artist and Philadelphia native, Alexander Calder. The maquette for Jerusalem Stabile holds the distinction of being the last and largest maquette that Calder ever made. A version of the work is in Holland Square in Jerusalem.

TURN TOWARDS COLLEGE GREEN

VAN PELT – DIETRICH LIBRARY CENTER, 3420 Walnut St.

The main <u>Penn Libraries</u> building on campus is informally referred to by its largest occupant, Van Pelt Library.

 The facility houses Van Pelt Library, the Lippincott Library, the Music Library and the Kislak Center for Special Collections, Rare Book &, Manuscripts and the Weigle Information Commons.

- <u>Van Pelt Library</u> is the main library within the Penn Libraries system, which houses over 6 million books and many online resources.
- Penn Libraries also offer workshops for students to further develop their skills in time management, research, writing, study strategies, and more.

The Van Pelt-Dietrich Library Center is also home to:

- <u>Center for Teaching & Learning (CTL)</u> (first floor): CTL offers workshops, observations, and materials review for graduate student teaching assistants and instructors.
 - CTL also conducts a three-day TA training in the summer for several Penn graduate schools.
- A <u>Graduate Reading Room</u> (5th floor): a graduate & professional student-only space with carrels and upholstered seating
- There is also a self-serve café and 24-hour study space on basement level.

SPLIT BUTTON Sculpture

Just in front of the entrance to Van Pelt is the Split Button sculpture, created by husband-and-wife team Claes Oldenburg and Coosje van Bruggen.

- The Split Button was installed in 1981 in front of Van Pelt Library and across from a large statue of Benjamin Franklin.
- The Button, as it is popularly called, measures 16' in diameter, weighs over 5000 pounds, and serves as an unofficial central landmark on campus.
- It is commonly believed that the artists were inspired by the Ben Franklin statue standing across from the sculpture in front of College Hall, placing the button as though it had popped off the seated Franklin's vest and split in two where it landed.

BENJAMIN FRANKLIN Statue

The Benjamin Franklin Statue in front of College Hall is one of three sculptures and over 80 works in Penn's collection featuring Franklin.

It was created by John Boyle, an American artist who studied at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts (PAFA) with Thomas Eakins and, later, at the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris.

Note: This tour is focused on the center of campus, from 34th to 38th Street. Campus extends beyond 34th Street to the east all the way to the Schuylkill River at 30th Street. If you continue east across 34th St. you will find School of Engineering buildings, athletics and recreational facilities, the Penn Museum, an ice-skating rink, and more!

CONTINUE TOWARDS 34th & WALNUT STREETS STOP: Southwest Corner of 34th & Walnut St.

BRICK HOUSE Sculpture

Simone Leigh's 16-feet tall bronze sculpture of a Black woman's head atop a round structure known as 'Brick House' can be found near the corner of 34th & Walnut Street, at the entrance of College Green.

- Brick House is Penn's newest piece of public art, donated by alumni Glenn and Amanda Fuhrman and installed in November 2020.
- The sculptor, Simone Leigh, is an American artist from Chicago who works in New York City.
- The sculpture is intended to celebrate Black Womanhood. It features cowrie shells on the woman's braids to symbolize wealth, femininity, and the African slave trade where shells were used as currency.

Also at the southwest corner of 34th & Walnut Streets is a small parking lot where you may find several popular food trucks on weekdays at lunchtime. Similar trucks offer an affordable, fast, and safe option for meals and can be found all around campus – on Spruce Street, 38th Street, and on the patio next to Pottruck gym.

FISHER-BENNETT HALL, 3340 Walnut St.

Fisher-Bennett Hall is located at the southeast corner of 34th and Walnut Streets.

- The building was originally constructed in 1925 as Bennett College, the first facility for women at Penn. The building housed classrooms, a library, a gymnasium, and a student union.
- The primary occupants of the building today include the English Department, English Language Programs, Music Department and Cinema Studies all within the School of Arts & Sciences.
- The building is one of many on campus with an odd shape reflecting the diagonal path that Woodland Avenue used to cut through campus.

HELPFUL TIP: Woodland Walk continues as a diagonal pedestrian path from 34th & Walnut northeast to Market St., just over a block from 30th Street Station. From here, you can take Amtrak and SEPTA regional rail trains, as well as the popular MegaBus and Bolt buses.

- SEPTA key is contactless chip card that can be reloaded with funds as a "travel wallet," or function as your TransPass or Day Pass.
- SEPTA Key Cards and passes can be purchased at bookstore, and from select SEPTA stations, including 30th St. Station & 34th St. subway/el station.
- If you use public transit every day, consider Student PennPass for discounted fares!

CROSS WALNUT AND CONTINUE NORTH ON 34TH STREET STOP: Corner of Sansom St. & 34th St.

Hill Square, 3355 Woodland Walk

On the east side of 34th Street is Hill Square, a well-maintained green space between the McNeil Center for Early American Studies and two undergraduate college houses, as well as a fraternity building on the corner.

What's a "college house"?

All first- and second-year undergraduates are required to live on campus. Once admitted, students apply one of Penn's 13 College Houses,

each of which have unique traditions and are located around campus. College Houses offer our students a shared community that reflects a range of passions and interests, as well as support systems and resources. The architectural styles vary from 24-story modern high-rises with over 800 residents to smaller, 4-story brick Houses with 170 residents.

SANSOM STREET between 34th & 36th Streets

Along the north side of Sansom Street are several buildings occupied by the **Carey School of Law**: Silverman Hall, Golkin Hall, and Tanenbaum Hall.

Along the south side of the street are a number of popular bars and restaurants.

- This is a convenient spot to meet up with friends or take visitors for good food and happy hour specials.
- The street is also home to Avril, a unique coffee shop and newsstand that carries a variety of international publications.

CONTINUE WEST ALONG SANSOM STREET STOP: Corner of 36th and Sansom Streets

The <u>Institute of Contemporary Art</u> (ICA) at the northwest corner of 36th and Sansom holds exhibitions, educational programs, and publications of contemporary art.

- Admission to ICA is free with your PennCard.
- Another museum on campus is our <u>Museum of</u>
 <u>Archeology and Anthropology</u> at 33rd & Spruce.
 This museum has mummies, sphinx, ancient
 Greek pottery and more. Also free with your
 PennCard.

The tall tower at the northwest corner of 36th & Sansom St. is **Sansom Place East**, one of two high rise residential buildings along Chestnut Street.

- Sansom Place East and West are apartment-style
 high rise buildings for graduate and professional student housing.
- The buildings reflect the international modernism style popular in architecture of the time they were constructed and stand in contrast to much shorter surrounding buildings.
- Please note: Sansom Place East will be undergoing renovations during the 2021-22 academic year.

Many of the offices that comprise Penn Wellness are located further north at 36th and Market Streets.

- Student Health Services is located at 3535 Market St, Suite #100 and provides healthcare to all students, even if you do not have student health insurance.
- Also located at 3535 Market St. is <u>Campus Health</u>, the public health office at Penn. Campus Health offers evidence-based wellness programming and resources students at Penn.
- Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS) is located at 3624 Market St. #1. CAPS provides a range of psychological and psychiatric services and resources to all students seeking support in fulfilling their personal and academic objectives. CAPS directly supports student mental health through counseling, crisis management, consultation, education and outreach, and training.

CONTINUE SOUTH ON 36th STREET STOP: 36th & Walnut St.

The tall building running along the east of 36th Street is the **Perelman Center for Political Science and Economics (PCPSE)**.

 PCPSE is one of Penn's newer academic buildings and houses the departments of Political Science and Economics, as well as several related academic programs, including: the Center for the Advanced Study of India (CASI), the Christopher H. Browne Center for International Politics (Browne Center), the Center for the Study of Contemporary China (CSCC), the Penn Program on Democracy, Citizenship, and Constitutionalism (DCC), and the Penn Institute for Economic Research (PIER).



Penn Bookstore

The **Penn Bookstore** is located across the street, at the northwest corner of Walnut and 36th Streets.

- The Penn Bookstore is operated by Barnes & Noble and features a range of products and services for members of the Penn community.
- In addition to course materials, you can find Penn branded merchandise, cards and stationery, and even a Starbucks and study space on the second floor!
- The store also frequently hosts open readings by authors during the academic year.
- The <u>Penn Card Center</u> is located on the 2nd floor the Bookstore.

CONTINUE WEST on WALNUT STREET STOP: Corner of 37th & Walnut

The <u>Penn Live Arts</u> performance arts center is located at the southeast corner of 37th & Walnut St.

- Penn Live Arts offers a variety of performances and artistic experiences, including dance, music and theater. They also bring in a lot of international artists.
- Students can purchase discounted tickets with their PennCard.
- Until 2021, Penn Live Arts was known as the Annenberg Center for the Performing Arts. You may still see this name used on some websites.

Just to the left of Penn Live Arts is the **Annenberg School for Communication**, founded in 1959.



Pottruck Fitness Center

The northwest corner is occupied by **Pottruck Health & Fitness Center**, one of two fitness centers on campus.

- Pottruck Fitness Center is a state-of-the art fitness center with a climbing wall, basketball courts, pool, juice bar, and more.
- Most full-time graduate and undergraduate students charged the full General Fee have free access to both the Pottruck Health & Fitness Center and Fox Fitness Center, located at 33rd Street. Discounted membership is available for other students.

If you continue west on Walnut to 40th Street, you'll find a number of fast casual restaurants, bars, and cafes; an Acme grocery store; a movie theater, and more!

CROSS WALNUT at 37th AND CONTINUE SOUTH to LOCUST WALK STOP: 37th & Locust Walk

The two buildings on the right are both occupied by the Graduate School of Education.

If you look down on 37th Street between Walnut and Spruce Streets, you will notice famous quotes our founder, Benjamin Franklin, embedded in the walkway.

Stiteler Hall (GSE)

The **Class of 1959 Plaza** at the northwest corner of 37th & Locust is a great public space with tables and chairs to enjoy lunch or study outdoors when the weather is nice.

• The <u>Lindemann Fountain</u>, located in the middle of the sunken square, is one of hundreds of pieces of public art on campus.

LOCUST HOUSE, 3643 Locust Walk

The <u>Penn Women's Center</u> (PWC) occupies most of the space in Locust House.

- PWC is one of the nation's oldest Women's Centers, founded in 1973
- The Women's Center's mission is to promote gender justice, and to empower, support, and advance personal and professional development.
- The Women's Center works with students, staff and faculty of all genders and identities.
- They hold support groups, educational programming, etc.

The <u>African-American Resource Center</u> (AARC) occupies half of the first floor of Locust House, alongside the Women's Center.

 AARC's services include advocacy, information and referral, workshops, support groups, consultation, counseling, and events to promote dialog on race and diversity issues for students, faculty, and staff at Penn of African descent.

Benjamin Franklin statue ("Ben on a Bench")

- This is one of three Ben Franklin statues on campus.
- It is popular to have your photo taken sitting next to Ben on the Bench. On graduation day, students wait in line in their caps and gowns to have their photo taken with Ben.

The southwest corner of 37th & Locust is occupied by two large fraternity houses.

 Because Penn's campus grew up within a residential neighborhood, many properties were built or purchased before Penn's campus extended to the surrounding blocks.

- As chapters lost their charters, many sold the buildings to the University, which has repurposed the
 buildings to bring the more important resources to the center of campus. In fact, many administrative
 buildings along Locust Walk used to be fraternities including the Grad Center! However much of
 Greek life still resides on Locust Walk.
- Other notable buildings on campus that are owned or operated by external organizations include the Wistar Institute at 36th & Spruce and St. Mary's Church at 39th & Locust Walk.

TURN RIGHT ONTO LOCUST WALK AND CONTINUE WEST STOP: Foot of 38th Street Pedestrian Bridge

HUNTSMAN HALL, 3730 Walnut St.

As you near 38th Street, you will notice a large cylindrical building on the right. This is Jon Huntsman Hall, which is part of the **Wharton School of Business**.

- Jon Huntsman Jr was a U.S. ambassador to China, and a 2012 Republican presidential hopeful before dropping out of the race. His father, Jon Huntsman Sr., donated to this building. They are both Penn alumni.
- Across Locust Walk is another Wharton building, the Steinberg Conference Center.

The **38**th **Street Pedestrian bridge** connects the western & eastern halves of campus

1920 Commons, 3800 Locust Walk

Just over the bridge on the south side of Locust Walk, you will find: the **1920 Commons**, a large building with a metal façade. Within this building you will find a campus dining hall, as well as:

- <u>Gourmet Grocer</u>, a small campus grab-and-go food market
- Amazon@Penn, which offers a convenient location where anyone can visit to pick up and return Amazon orders.

Perry World House

Perry World House, 3803 Locust Walk

Across Locust Walk from 1920 Commons is **Perry World House**, a global research and policy center that works to bridge the gap between academia and the policy world on the most pressing global issues.

Perry World House helps educate the Penn community and prepare students to be well-informed, contributing global citizens, while also connecting Penn with leading policy experts from around the world to develop and advance innovative policy proposals.

Kelly Writers House, 3508 Locust Walk

Kelly Writers House is a center for writers of all kinds from the Penn community and beyond.

- The House offers over 150 public programs per year including poetry readings, film screenings, musical performances, a variety of workshops and summer camps and more!
- All Penn students can access the House's spaces like the cozy living room or Arts Cafe and over 500 people visit the space each week.





Further down Locust Walk are several college houses, including three tall residential towers.

Other programs and resources located on the west side of campus include:

<u>Civic House</u> at 39th and Locust Walk is Penn's hub for student-led community service and social advocacy work.

- Civic House promotes mutually beneficial collaborations between Penn and many nonprofit organizations in the Philadelphia area.
- They offer social justice education and outreach, trainings, and engagement opportunities to prepare students to become more responsible and empowered members of their communities.
- The Civic House building was originally
 a suburban house and later served as
 the rectory for neighbor St. Mary's Church, before being acquired by Penn.

CARRIAGE HOUSE, 3907 Spruce (access from Irving St.)

The <u>LGBT Center</u> helps cultivate a campus climate where all students, regardless of their gender or sexual identity, can live authentically.

- The LGBT Center provides programming, resources, training, and support to all members of the Penn community.
- The LGBT Center is located in a converted carriage house with ornamental brick and a slate roof that is part of the original Potts House (3905 Spruce) complex, which houses <u>Penn Press</u>.

Additionally, two of Penn's graduate schools are located on the western part of campus:

- The **School of Veterinary Medicine** at Spruce St between 38th & 39th Streets
- The **School of Dental Medicine** on 40th Street between Locust St. and Spruce Street.


McNeil Building, 3718 Locust Walk

On your left is the **McNeil Building**. The upper floors of McNeil are home to several social science departments and classrooms, as well as the Population Study Center Library and Social Science Data Center.

Access to ground and upper floors is through entrances on the east or west side of the building.

Career Services is located in the lower level of McNeil, accessed from Lehman Quad.

> Career Services has dedicated graduate advising teams and resources supporting most graduate and professional students at Penn. (The others have school-specific career services offices).

STOUFFER COMMONS, 3702 Spruce St. Suite 300 **Entrance on Woodland Walk**

Weingarten Learning Resources Center (WLRC) is located on the second floor of Stouffer Commons, which is connected to Stouffer College House.

- WLRC includes the Learning Resources Office, Student Disabilities Services, and the undergraduate Tutoring Center.
- The <u>Learning Resources</u> team provides professional instruction in relevant skills such as academic reading, writing, study strategies, and time management to all Penn students. They also provide one-on-one academic coaching for students at all levels.





Student Disability Services provides comprehensive, professional services and programs for students who self-identify with disabilities to ensure equal academic opportunities and participation in University-sponsored programs.

The Quadrangle, 3700 Spruce St.

The Quadrangle (Quad) stretches from 36th to 38th Streets and from Spruce Street to Hamilton Walk (Pine Street) and is among the most photographed structures at Penn.

- The Quadrangle was constructed in 1895 as the first major dormitory built by the University. Prior to that point, most Penn students came from the Philadelphia area and commuted to school from their homes.
- Inspired by the English college systems of Oxford and Cambridge, the Quad was planned as a complete community, housed in separate but contiguous buildings enclosing a large quadrangle in the middle. The popularity of the Quad among with a student body that was increasingly from outside the Philadelphia area.
- Additions to the complex were constructed in 1899, 1905, 1908, 1911 and 1928.
- The Quad housed only male students until 1971, when it was opened to women.
- There are 3 College Houses Fisher Hassenfeld College House,
 Ware College House and Riepe College House consisting of 39 individual houses.

Class of 1956 Trolley, Spruce St. & Woodland Walk

A gift from the Class of 1956, this partial replica of a 1920s trolley is a symbol of a time when the University campus was rapidly expanding West and Philadelphia's public light rail transportation network crisscrossed the campus.

- The end of the trolley shell facing Spruce St. shelters the stairwell serving the current SEPTA 37th and Spruce Streets station platform.
- The eastern end the other provides a nostalgic recreation of a period trolley interior.

CONTINUE ALONG WOODLAND WALK STOP: STEINHART PLAZA

The last stop on this tour is **Steinhart Plaza**, a quiet shaded space with a bubbling fountain.

Located near the center of campus behind Steinberg-Dietrich Hall, the plaza offers a space where members of the Penn community can enjoy a quiet lunch or study away from the bustling pace of Locust Walk.

You can continue from here along Woodland Walk to reach Locust Walk and 36th Street.
