McKay DEI November '20 Newsletter:

Good afternoon! The McKay DEI committee hopes you are well during this eventful month in our city and country.

We were heartbroken to learn of another fatal police shooting of a Black man in Philadelphia two weeks ago. If you are unaware of the situation with Walter Wallace, we encourage you to learn more about the story behind what is causing so much pain in our city as well as about the national context of disproportionate police violence against members of the Black and disabled communities below.

<u>Here's what we know about the shooting.</u> This incident has again brought to attention the <u>insufficiency of</u> <u>de-escalation training</u> in most police departments. As summarized by the mental health-focused organization <u>Fountain House</u>, "One in four deaths at the hands of police are people having a mental health emergency. They are disproportionately Black and other people of color [...]." While <u>some</u> have called for police reform, <u>many advocates and organizations</u> argue that better, preventative healthcare in combination with non-police first responders who are trained to deal with mental health crises will help to reduce police killings of Black and disabled people like Wallace.
