This guidance is intended to assist with risk assessment, monitoring and work restriction decisions for HCP. These scenarios do not cover all potential exposure scenarios and should not replace individual assessments of risk, and the clinical judgment made by Occupational Medicine (OM) and infection Control (IC) leadership.

#### **Strategies to Mitigate HCP Staffing Shortages:**

Maintaining staffing during a pandemic is essential to the safe delivery of patient care, and to ensuring a safe work environment for HCP. As such Occupational Medicine, Infection Control and entity leadership may consider, on a case-by-case basis, permitting specific HCP to return to work without meeting all return to work criteria as outlined above. Asymptomatic exposed HCP may be permitted to work as a crisis capacity strategy to address staffing shortages if they wear a facemask for 14 days after the exposure.
